JOHN GONANO

I have a distinct memory of wondering where the Churches were during the build up to the Iraq War. Why were they so silent? Then I came to a service at SPC and Randy stated clearly from the pulpit, *This march to war must stop!* I was also made to feel very welcome and issues like outreach to migrant workers was embraced.
- 2. Primarily Lutheran Churches growing up. St Joseph Catholic Church as an adult.

EILEEN ESPINOZA

- 1. I attended for the first time in 2010/2011 or so with Skylar Benedict's family (Georgia and Bill who attend online now). I sat in the balcony and felt so at home watching Randy Tremba preach. I immediately loved the sampling/ supplement of multiple faith traditions and the global perspective for this small town. While I never attended regularly, I visited SPC several times a year from 2013-2016. My grandfather, David Ruhala, who was not a member but who was often a family guest with myself to Skylar's family, had his Celebration of Life at this church in the spring of 2015. That meant a great deal to me that Randy Tremba would officiate this event, even though we were only community members, as Christians without a church. Because of this experience, it was very fulfilling to me to have Jennifer's and my service for Rosalia at SPC.
- 2. For much of my life, I have had such an ache in my heart for a spiritual community that felt like "home," that accepted me and also embraced ritual and tradition. I'm drawn to the mystical elements of my family's Orthodoxy and the progressive-thinking of More Light Presbyterians. I have gleaned this from many years of attending both Protestant and Catholic services around the US. It hasn't been until this year that I felt drawn to truly belong to a church and community. My family and friends have been my connection to churches. As eastern

european immigrants, my family used to be practicing Byzantine Orthodox, but my generation (my brothers and I) were raised in an ambiguously Christian way. We had a lot of traditional Orthodox icons and religious art in our home, but did not participate in any of the traditions. My mother was raised more strictly Orthodox, with fasting days and multi-day celebrations for Easter and all-night vigils. I craved these ecstatic experiences, though I did not have the language for this desire. My parents (who are divorced and remarried) did not take us to church, besides for our baptism, but rather encouraged us to go with friends or other family members to their churches. Through these myriad experiences, I sampled a lot of different traditions within Catholicism and Protestantism. SPC is the first church I have ever belonged to! Brief background of churchgoing experiences: My parents and grandparents belonged to St Nicholas (Byzantine Orthodox) in Washington, D.C. before I was born. As a child and teen, I was an infrequent visitor of several churches in Virginia, West Virginia, California, and Michigan, including St Stephen's Episcopal Church (where I was baptized at age 9), First Presbyterian Church in Flint, Michigan (my mother and grandfather's hometown church, and where my great uncle is interred), and St Theresa's Catholic Church in Palm Springs, CA (where other aunts and uncles are members). My father's sister, Susan, is married to a Baptist pastor who serves in upstate New York. As a child visiting my cousins during the summer, I would attend baptist sermons. I found this church experience to be dogmatic and uninviting. As a youth and teen, my neighbors attended an Assembly of God church in Tomahawk, WV, and I went a dozen times or so. I found this church to be ruthlessly evangelical and I did not attend after middle school. In high school, I occasionally attended Pentecostal services in Martinsburg with my best friend, whose family is very evangelical. I

did not remotely enjoy the message or zeal of this church, though the drama of the sermons (including tent revivals and snake handling!) was definitely moving. Towards the end of my high school experience, my close friend Skylar Benedict offered to bring me to his family's church here in Shepherdstown, which happened to be SPC! SPC became the church I attended for holidays and when I was back home visiting. I felt such a connection to the space and the community, as well as the progressive message of the More Light movement. Attending SPC with Skylar sparked my interest in joining a church community. While in graduate school, I attended mass several times a vear with extended family at St Theresa's Catholic Church in Palm Springs, California. While I enjoyed the solemnity of service, the message felt hollow and I did not connect to mass. When I visited Shepherdstown during those years, I attended Christmas Eve services at St Peter's Lutheran. When Jennifer and I moved to Shepherdstown in 2022, I told her about my experiences attending SPC with Skylar and my grandfather, and we decided to attend our first services together in January 2023.

- 3. I have desired this kind of community for my whole life. I think that people are the hands of God, and I think that the only way (for me) to truly live God's (whoever that may be to anyone!) word is through action faith, to me, is demonstrated by action. I am drawn to service and community care, very much so, and being a part of SPC feeds my soul's desire to help.
- 4. What drew me most to SPC then and now is the inclusion of children in the sermon and church life. First Pew is what caught my heart the most I had never seen this approach before. 10 years later, I'm so happy to teach sunday school here! I also absolutely love that SPC embraces other faith traditions as sources for inspiration and worship. I particularly

- admire all of the poetry selections and music programming.
- 5. I think SPC is doing so great at community outreach. I want to learn more about the queer and trans activism of the church and join the youth in that; this is something that very much drew me to SPC. I also would like to learn more about our community outreach and what we have planned for the new year. I love the work of Shepherdstown Shares — I wonder if SPC might make a connection with them if we don't already. We could also create our own food pantry or Free Shop to serve our congregants and town. I know that our congregation seems pretty middle-class, but I would like to help reach those in need in our church or beyond. Coming from a very rural and blue collar background, issues of hunger and food security is super important to me. That said, I definitely want to get involved in the community meals that we do offer!!
- 6. We are so excited to continue our journey at SPC and so thrilled to have found a home here!

JENNIFER ESPINOZA

1. I first attended service a few months after moving to Shepherdstown. I came here with my wife Eileen, who grew up in the area and went to school at Shepherd. She had attended SPC on occasion in the past, and had shared with me that she thought it was a special place. I grew up in a pretty repressive fundamentalist evangelical church, and after many years of processing that, I realized my deep and true faith in Christ was completely separate from the institutions that had harmed me. I was interested in finding and attending a church and working on my relationship with God in a serious way. I craved the experience of being part of a church that would see me for who I was and not reject me for being trans. Fortunately, SPC was that church! From the first time I attended in April of 2023, it was very clear that SPC takes its beliefs seriously, and there was such a strong sense of dedicated energy when it came to

speaking out about issues facing marginalized groups, as well as material action being taken to support others in the way Christ wants us to. I found in SPC a true reflection of my understanding of scripture and of our responsibilities as followers of Christ. After meeting with Pastor Gusti during our first attendance, my wife and I instantly decided we wanted to join the church.

- 2. The churches I went to growing up were affiliated with Calvary Chapel and Harvest fellowships. As mentioned above, I did not return to any church until attending SPC.
- 3. My faith is the most important thing to me in my life, and while I've had a long spiritual journey in coming to understanding my relationship with God, I find myself craving more communal experiences of Christ's love as well as continuous guidance and wisdom, deeper study of scripture, and to seek opportunities to practice my faith and put it into action. Service is also very important to me as someone who teaches Sunday school classes at SPC; instilling a love-centered vision of Christian life within young people is something extremely close to my heart.
- 4. Welcoming new people (especially those from marginalized communities) into the fold, and giving us opportunities to contribute and be of service in a real way.
- 5. Nothing I can think of! SPC stands as an example for other churches to look to and learn from, in my opinion.
- 6. SPC has given so much to Eileen and I in the short time we've been attending, and we are just excited for any opportunity to give back!

*JENNIFER JONES

- 1. I've attended SPC throughout the years since the 1980s. I attended the 2020 Christmas Eve service where I met Gusti and decided to attend on line during COVID. I joined the church in 2022.
- 2. Otterbein UM is my childhood church that I attended throughout my life while visiting my

- hometown of Huntington WV. I attend for spiritual nourishment provided through our music, community, Paster Gusti's sermons and the overall support that I feel from our special church and our amazing members.
- 3. SPC does community very well. Also, our services are designed/planned to flow and to pull together and complement the scripture lesson. The readings, music and message are all aligned and that creates great cohesion.
- 4. I really don't know what we could do better.
- 5. My extended family and I have been in Shepherdstown (for me, off and on) since the 1970s. I attended Shepherd College. I love this town and I chose to retire here over every other place in the country. I've lived in 8 states and am grateful to have been back in Shepherdstown for the past 22 years.

SUSAN LOVELL

- 1 & 2. My husband, Randall, and I started attending SPC in the summer of 2019. We arrived at SPC while visiting various churches after having been life-long United Methodists (most recently as a part of the Otterbein United Methodist Church in Martinsburg). As parents of four children, including a gay son, SPC being part of "More Light Presbyterians" was appealing to us. We realized SPC's sign "We Choose Welcome" is not just a decoration but the genuine representation of the attitude we felt right away. Once we visited SPC, our search was over.
- 3. We have also always appreciated being part of a church family to give and get support from others in our faith journey and to share life experiences from people with similar values. It is also important for us to be a part of the life of a church congregation and to have the opportunity to regularly re-charge our relationship with the Lord through worship.
- 4. One of the things SPC does well is addressing tough issues with an open opportunity to discuss opinions in a safe space. The discussions may sometimes challenge our

comfort zones, but help us to more clearly identify our understandings and sometimes make us aware of alternate viewpoints. We are also very pleased with the SPC response to the pandemic challenges. We were thrilled to be able to worship remotely and this worship style has helped us get to know others in the second service that we might not have gotten to know with our previous in-person experience. We spend a lot of time in Oklahoma visiting family and so are pleased to be able to continue to worship remotely and stay connected to our church family when away from home.

- 5. Because we've been so pleased with our SPC experience, it is more difficult to identify things that SPC could do better. I think perhaps having recently "shopped around" at other churches, I am aware of some marketing tools that SPC doesn't seem to use. Often when visiting another church for the first time, we were offered a packet of information that included key programs of the church and often received a personal follow-up by way of post card, note card or email inviting us back. When visiting SPC, we were given an invitation to introduce ourselves as first time visitors during worship (which we did); but, there wasn't any follow-up related to that introduction.
- 6. My husband has Early Onset-Alzheimer's.

*MICA MARTIN

- 1. I came to SPC for the first time to attend an event with a Celtic singer and composer about 10 years ago.
