#### **PASTOR'S NOTE: Staying the Course**

As we journey through the heart of summer, the rhythms of our worship life at SPC offer a gentle yet powerful invitation: to stay the course—not just in our activities as a congregation, but in the deeper sense of remaining faithful to the ongoing work of the Spirit among us.

July begins with reflections from our Deacon Shepherds on how their ministry has evolved in partnership with God and one another as we engage the Way and Spirit of Jesus in formation and practice.

Then, as I take some time for vacation and continuing education, "The Parents of SPC" will continue a tradition begun last summer by sharing stories of how they live their faith and practice with their families and in the workplace. Associate General Presbyter, Rev. Nancy Meehan-Yao, will preach and administer the Sacrament of Communion the first Sunday of August.

I will return for the remaining Sundays in August to explore how the exhortation of the Book of Hebrews toward "movement discipline" in the first century Way of Jesus informs our current commitment to disrupting tyrannical power in the twenty-first century.

Even as I take time for rest and study, our collective ministry continues. This is not a time of pause, but a time of deepening. A time to deepen our practice of *refuge*, as we find shelter in one another and in God's ongoing presence. A time to deepen our nurturing of *resilience*, in the quiet ways we keep showing up, tending to the soul of our community. A time to deepen our commitment to *resistance*, as we hold fast to justice and mercy in a time of increasing cruelty. A time to deepen our *reimagining*, as we explore together what the Spirit might be whispering next into our shared life.

Whether you spend this summer in the pews, online, or away for a while in your own rhythm of rest, I pray the Spirit will "Stay the Course" with you and with our entire community, traveling light, walking together, and trusting in the God who has already prepared for us the path ahead.

## CHILDREN AND YOUTH UPDATE Christa Mastrangelo Joyce Director of Children and Youth Formation

This month the focus is on our confirmands—Evelyn Bailey, Mileur Bailey, Joel Dillow, and Hazel Hitt. These young people have spent the past five months preparing to become members of the church through their confirmation journey.

The profession of faith ("membership confirmation") activates full membership in the church itself. Missional confirmation inspires a missional identity and commissions young adults (13-16) to a missional vocation. Missional confirmation asks us to consider living as an instrument of renewal and restoration for the world. It prepares young people for the laying on of hands, prayer for strengthening the Spirit and for anointing into the priesthood of all believers.

From January to June, I worked alongside adult mentors, Sherry Sykes, Mary Ellen Lloyd, Natasha Baihly, Dave Smith, and the youths' parents to strengthen confirmands:

- In their identities as God's image-bearing stewards of the goodness and beauty of creation
- In the Spirit's gifts of wisdom and understanding, counsel and might, knowledge and the fear of the Lord, and joy in God's presence
- In their vocations as members of the priesthood of all believers, commissioned for missional engagement in the world.
- In their understanding of the importance of community relationships and the opportunity to be part of God's mission through the community of SPC

Each of the adults shared their own faith journey and how this journey brought them to choose SPC as their faith community. Then, over the course of four 2-hour meetings, and one overnight retreat, the youth and I, along with Mary Anne Hitt, used Biblical foundation to consider the role of the Holy Spirit, the uniqueness of each person's gifting to live into the mission of God and to serve others, and to contemplate what it means to be a "priest" in the "priesthood of all believers."

What, according to our youth, does it mean to be a priest? In the resumé the four created together, those qualified are: anyone! (since everyone is a child of God), and the qualifications include: being kind, loyal, thoughtful, compassionate, hardworking, and devoted.

This was a deeply meaningful five months of consideration, contemplation, and conversation that encouraged these young adults to engage with one another, listen deeply, be open to getting to know themselves and their adult leaders. And, along the way, they each discerned on their own, that SPC is the kind of faith home where they want to live into the mission of God.

#### **JUNE SESSION HIGHLIGHTS**

Session's June meeting was opened with a Loving-Kindness meditation led by Pastor Gusti.

Finance reported that we're now about 42% of the way through the year and our income (less special gifts) is at 48% of the plan and overall, our expenses are running about as expected. Operating expenses are on track for this time of year. However, we are entering a slow part of the year for giving.

Presbytery met in Woodstock, VA. Harry Daniel was accepted as a member of the Presbytery. The next General Assembly meeting will be in Milwaukee in 2026.

Pastor Gusti reported that she will be away on vacation/study leave between July 7 and August 3. She is continuing to work to arrange a meeting with Senator Capito and the 50 or so people that have signed up.

Deacons are continuing their work around the "Varieties of Gifts" passage from Corinthians. New members have been assigned a deacon. They are planning to have an updated Deacon brochure ready to hand out in July.

Matthew 25 hosted a panel discussion on the drastic impacts of the House budget reconciliation bill currently in the Senate. The panel consisted of Mary Anne Hitt (energy and climate impacts), Dr.Catherine Feaga (Medicaid and impacts on rural WV hospitals and nursing homes) and Pastor Gusti (primer on "Spirit-led Resistance). Diane Blust briefly discussed cuts to food pantries. The discussion was recorded and will be available to those who are interested.

Property was happy to report that the A/C had been repaired and that they continue to research necessary projects for the future.

Session doesn't meet in July, so the next stated meeting will be August 14.

The SPC Session meets the 2nd Thursday of the month from 7-9 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall and via Zoom. Meetings are open to any member of the congregation who wishes to attend. Contact Suellen Myers, Clerk of Session, to learn more.

#### **DEACON TEAM UPDATE**

#### **Donna Dettling, Deacon Moderator**

At our monthly deacon meeting on June 7, Pastor Gusti led our development work around the 'Varieties of Gifts' passage from 1 Corinthians 12:4-11. We learned that the Greek word for 'service' is 'deacon,' and discussed the gifts listed in these verses. It was emphasized that we can bring our individual gifts into our deacon ministry; we don't all have to do it the same way or conform to a particular mold. Each gift serves the same God.

We paired this with our deacon work, in which Jen Jones facilitated a discussion about what it might look like to live out the SPC Core Commitments through our deacon service, using our own gifts. We found many common threads in our paired conversations, and listed these for an expanded dialogue during our August meeting.

Deacons who haven't taken the **Presbytery's Boundary Training** were encouraged to sign up for one of the available Zoom sessions in June. **New members have been assigned a deacon**, and will be receiving an introductory communication from them. **Summer is a great time to set up a meeting with your deacon in person!** Making these connections is so important to the life and well-being of the congregation, and we highly recommend them. #### **INTERVIEW - JULIEANN (JULIE) GIBSON**

Julie grew up in Rockford, Illinois. Her family was very active including her parents, grandparents, and aunts and uncles on both sides. They enjoyed reading, working jigsaw puzzles and playing cards. Julie says they had many conversations and she admits that these are conversations that she would like to have with them now that she is older. Her brother, Alan, and a nephew and his

family currently live in the Shepherdstown area.

She graduated from East High School in Rockford in 1971. She notes that back then they had courses in shop, theater, orchestra, sewing, and cooking. She graduated from Woods College in Fulton, Missouri, in 1975, earning a BA in music, with minors in history and religion.

After a visit with a college roommate in Los Angeles and staying in LA for 13 years, Julie moved to Tucson, Arizona. While in LA, she was married and worked using machinery-prepared bank statements.

While growing up in State Street Baptist Church in Rockford, she began her church choir career. When she moved to Tucson, she attended Northminster Presbyterian Church. After moving to Shepherdstown, she found SPC was a good choice for her; she has been a member for five years. At SPC, Julie is a member of the choir, the handbell ensemble, and participates in the Sunday Seminars.

Outside of SPC, Julie sits in the alto section of the Masterworks Chorale and also plays the bass in the Charles Washington Symphony Orchestra. This orchestra was founded in 2012 and is based in Charles Town, WV. She has also taken numerous Lifelong Learning classes at Shepherd University.

She has traveled to Europe, the British Isles, and Hawaii (when Hawaii had just become a state). Her trip to England in 1972 added units to her history minor.

Julie admires her paternal grandmother who taught piano lessons and her maternal grandmother who was a woman Deacon, and who served the communion elements alongside the men. Julie is in possession of both of their Bibles.

Julie counts *Fantasia* (the 1940 animated musical film produced by Walt Disney) and *Fantasia 2000* (a sequel to the 1940 film) as her favorite films.

She says music used to be a hobby, but now considers it a career. She adds that she never expected to be using her music in Shepherdstown at the age of 72.
