A NEW TITLE FOR CHRISTA! by Larry and Joyce Neumark

Christa Mastrangelo Joyce has recently had a change in title for her work at SPC. She is now Director of Children and Youth Formation. Before we delve into that change, we wanted to get to know Christa a little better and what got her to where she is now.

Christa grew up mainly in Maryland through her college years due to her father's position as a Park Ranger. They lived briefly in WV for his job, but later returned to

Maryland. They spent a great deal of time in Shepherdstown during this timeframe.

Christa is a graduate of Towson University; however, two years of her undergraduate work were taken at Shepherd University. She has an MFA degree in creative writing from Antioch University in Los Angeles, but began her teaching career at Dean College in Massachusetts in the English department, where she stayed for four years until she and her husband Greg moved to Shepherdstown in 2005. She was then hired by American University to teach in their English department. Her move to Shepherdstown in 2005 was to partner in a restaurant called Stone Soup Bistro. A lot of her family lived in the area and she wanted to be near them as well as fulfill a dream of restaurant ownership. Christa helped operate the restaurant for several years.

After her daughter Ava was born, Christa did not want to return to full-time teaching and commuting to American University. However, she longed for a way to teach that brought together mind, body, and spirit. She took yoga training and earned her certification to teach and began teaching yoga in 2006. By 2009 she was teaching one class in her brother's former juice bar location. This grew organically into one studio by the end of 2010, then three studios by 2020. Needing a change of pace in 2020, she closed all of the locations in 2021 and now offers only one class each week at a new location. She also trains others to teach and has attended international yoga retreats.

In addition to her daughter who is now 18 and will graduate in 2025, Christa also has a son Michael (15), who is a sophomore. She has homeschooled her children from kindergarten through high school, with a brief respite when her children attended a hybrid school.

Her involvement with SPC started in 2009 when she was invited to attend a Peacefest event at SPC by two of her yoga students. This was her first visit to a Presbyterian church and she was enticed to stay by the energy of the congregation, the music, vision, and involvement of other local families.

With her new title and expanded hours, the professionalism of the position has made it possible for her to begin connecting with other ministries within SPC with the hope of connecting joint missions for the church community. She has also been able to connect with folks outside the church in an effort to expand the "church" community outside the walls of SPC. She will be taking some classes to gain important professional development training and to utilize this training to grow her work with the youth and children. Four years ago, she never would have imagined all this. She states, "It has become one of the greatest surprise gifts of this period of my life. The beauty of this is that it feels like my whole formation journey, from my lifetime of spiritual development to my years of professional development, has led to where I am now."

Christa tells us "writing and words were my first love and one of the first ways I related to God." The focus of Christa's MFA was in poetry and she had many individual poems published during those years as well as one full manuscript of poetry. Through college and beyond she wrote for a local Baltimore magazine called *Style* and for *Women's World*, as well as a variety of local newspapers. She still writes poetry and has a dream of writing a book, but now her writing mostly appears on her weekly Substack publication called "Your Sunday Retreat."

When asked about whom she admires (past or present), she says she would have had a different answer if she were in her 30s. She now realizes that she admires people who are fully themselves, who show up in the world fully, are willing to love and be loved, are able to listen across divides, and are full embodied beings.

As for any favorite books or films, she says she is revisiting a long-held favorite, *Tattoos on the Heart*, by Father Gregory Boyle. The films *Life is Beautiful* and *Babette's Feast* are two of her favorites.

Thank you, Christa, for sharing your background with us. And congratulations on your new title! We have every confidence that you will excel in your work with the children and youth of SPC.



OCTOBER SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

- Stewardship Campaign: This year's Focus on the Future stewardship campaign has begun, aiming for a pledge income goal of \$280,000 to support budget priorities. Look for the pledge letters and respond early.
- Maintaining the church building: Under Daryl Kuster's guidance, new flooring will soon be installed upstairs of the FH and a new HVAC will be installed in the downstairs of the FH. Thank you, Daryl and Sam, for responding to flooding caused by the old HVAC's failure.
- Guns to Gardens: Thank you congregation for giving generously to the special
 offering to support the G2G event. The fundraising goal was met and the event was
 a success!
- A Focus on Food Insecurity: Planning is underway to host Rev Rebecca Barnes, Coordinator of the Presbyterian Hunger Program, who will facilitate a community workshop on food security on Saturday, November 16, and preach the following Sunday, both at SPC. Local stakeholder groups from food pantries, food security advocates, local farmers, and faith leaders will attend the workshop.
- **Cold Weather Shelter**: This will now become an All-Weather Shelter and JCCM will coordinate volunteers to support the shelter at a central location. Look for a request for volunteers to help those in need of shelter.
- Week in prayer November 3 through 9: As part of a week in prayer, sponsored by the SMA, SPC will host an interdenominational service on the evening of Sunday, November 3, centered on music, poetry, and readings.

Seven Deacons participated in this valuable training, and others will take it on a later date.

Our next meeting is Thursday, October 24, when we will consider how flock members might feel when they make a PrayerNet request, and how we can match our responses with their expectations.

PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

At the October 3 Presbyterian Women meeting, Diana Eldridge led fourteen of us in a discussion about Chapter 1 in the book *Always with Us? – What Jesus Really Said about the Poor*, by Rev. Dr. Liz Theoharis, titled 'Is Ending Poverty Possible?' We talked about some of the misrepresentations about people struggling with ongoing poverty, and Diana shared a story about the uncertainties caused by a time of financial insecurity in her own life. We watched a short video from the Poor People's Campaign that highlighted the poignant stories of the impact of poverty on real individuals who were willing to let their voices be heard. We listened to the Deuteronomy 15 passage about the forgiveness of debts, and discussed roadblocks to the establishment of programs to provide meaningful help, instead of merely handouts, to the poor.

Ideas were captured from the group on possible projects we might do to enhance our study on poverty, and about ways to welcome and include those who have interest in the PW group but aren't able to meet with us on weekday mornings. Watch for more on these conversations!

Despite the reality that the tasks of sorting, purging, and organizing are not everyone's favorite activities, we had a great response to our call for volunteers to do just that throughout the church building. There was a hive of activity during the week of August 12 - 16, as around 20 people showed up to help at different times, in a specific area, or wherever they were needed. The most significant purge was done in the library, with countless books being removed from the shelves and 30+ boxes of them taken to Wonder Books after the congregation had a chance to rehome some.

There was also considerable work done in the choir room, the youth and children's areas, and the kitchen. The first upstairs classroom was turned into a dedicated meeting room, and numerous closets were given a new, orderly life! Many bags and boxes of trash, recycle, and donatable items were disposed of, given to community organizations, or taken from the giveaway tables in Fellowship Hall.

But the question that remains is, "Have all unneeded items been purged?" And the resounding answer is, "NO!" There is more work to be done in certain areas around the building, and this will be a continuing priority. We plan to take photos of the organized areas to be posted in those spaces for reference. We will also put together an inventory list to keep in the office, noting items and their storage places, to keep searching to a minimum and remind folks where to return things they might have used.

We hope the church is starting to feel lighter and more welcoming to all who come through the doors, and especially those who have reason to go beyond the sanctuary. Grateful thanks to all who participated in this new annual event! Many hands made light work, and we couldn't have done so much without you.
