What We Do Matters to God—Living Matthew 25 By Anne Teresa

In the Fall of 2023 Pastor Gusti based several sermons on Matthew 25, particularly the invitation in the parable of the sheep and goats, in which Jesus makes clear that what we do matters to God and how we treat others is important to God. The PC (USA) Matthew 25 Initiative invites Presbyterian congregations and other organizations to actively engage in the world around them – to tackle systemic racism and systemic poverty, climate change, and build relationships among congregations. Matthew 25 is not a program, but more of a scriptural vision.

And yet, here it is, right here in Matthew 25, for those of us who have not yet figured out God cares far more about what we do - or in this case what we do not do - than what we claim to believe or disbelieve. If we want to live in a world that is just, Matthew 25 insists, we have to practice living justly. We simply need to do, day in and day out, what Jesus says to do right here in Matthew 25: offer raw unfettered human companionship to those who continue to be vulnerable. Treat others with genuine caring and courageous witness. Suffer in solidarity while also seeking - and finding - spiritual solace. Rev. Gusti Newquist

To date, 1197 congregations, 85 presbyteries, 11 synods, and 67 other groups have joined the Matthew 25 movement, including 16 churches in our Presbytery. Matthew 25 provides a framework for congregational time and treasure, is tailored to local needs, and encourages us to partner with allies and advocates to increase our impact.

SPC is exploring three areas:

- Support for the Community Cup in Martinsburg
- Food Insecurity
- Clean Water


What will move us forward as a spiritual community, as residents of the 4th poorest state in the U.S., and as a whole denomination? We do have some opportunities waiting for us to explore. Helping at the Community Cup, whether at Friday evening worship services or just stopping by for a cup of coffee and greeting the regulars, gives us a window into the varied and challenging life situations the vulnerable encounter. Learning about why so many are hungry in our area will move us beyond giving food to, potentially, reducing that need. We need to know more about our water and the impacts of chemical spills, regulation rollbacks and policies that are not consistent with clean water for everyone: West Virginians pay more than any other state for municipal water.

Systemic change focuses on long-term solutions, choosing the work that will have the most impact. We need your interest, input and engagement to identify which of these areas SPC can best tackle to effect the kind of change that stems the tide.

Meet the Dettlings! They are new to our church, having attended their first service on Christmas Eve 2019. They became members in February 2023. As a child, Donna's family, which includes five siblings, moved quite a bit. Eventually they moved to Montgomery County, Maryland, and she graduated from Walter Johnson High School. Brian's longstanding family roots were in California, specifically the Mojave Desert, where he grew up riding trail bikes. Eventually his family moved to Springfield, Virginia. Donna and Brian

met online and discovered that they lived only four miles from each other. Brian recalls, "We found each other in the February blizzard." Each has "a pair of kids" (a boy and a girl) and seven grandchildren between them.

They moved to Shepherdstown in 2019, liking "the artsy uniqueness" of the town as well as the cultural opportunities, such as CATF, the Conservation Film Festival, and the Shepherdstown Speak Story Series. Donna's career was in accounting with Marriott, from which she retired in 2023. Brian was a technical writer in private industry and various government agencies. He also has a long history of working with props in theater productions and with independent filmmakers. He "self-retired" in the fall of 2023.

Donna, a lifelong Presbyterian, has an interest in mission. In her previous church she was "super involved" with mission trips to Mexico. She organized six trips there and helped build houses for those in need. Brian, although not previously a churchgoer, credits Donna "for bringing me into the fold." Together they like "the warm feel" of SPC and "what the church stands for." Donna was selected as an SPC Deacon beginning in 2024. Additionally, she is active with Presbyterian Women and organizes the 11 a.m. communion servers.

They both enjoy reading, with Donna having read or listened to around 100 books last year. Some of her favorites include *Demon Copperhead* by Barbara Kingsolver and *The Covenant of Water* by Abraham Verghese. She is involved with two book clubs and is currently starting one in her neighborhood. Additionally, she enjoys painting and gardening and is in the Master Naturalist program of the Potomac Valley Audubon Society. Brian's taste in books is more "light fare," including intrigue and adventure books, biographical books about motorcycle racers, as well as films.

When asked about someone they admire, Brian cited Dean Goodine, a Canadian "property master guy," whose successful films include "Unforgiven" and "Open Range." Brian considers Dean a "colleague and mentor." Donna highlighted her father, who was a ground attack pilot in World War II. He was shot down and captured by the Germans over the border in France and held as a POW for nine months. Although treated well by the Germans, he suffered a broken back, ankle, and shoulder. A young nurse took care of him and nursed him back to health. It turned out that nurse became Donna's mother, as the soldier and nurse eventually got married! "It is quite a story," Donna reminisced.

We are happy that Brian and Donna found their way to SPC. Welcome Brian and Donna!

The Advocacy Committee for LGBTQIA+ Equity encourages churches and presbyteries to recognize March 31 as Transgender Day of Visibility

Picture a life shrouded in secrecy, where your true essence remains concealed from the world. Your official documents do not reflect who you truly are. Every public appearance demands that you wear a mask, hiding behind a facade that doesn't align with your inner truth. Imagine facing legal barriers that limit your access to essential healthcare, participation in sports, and even the use of public restrooms. Amid this oppressive environment, consider the profound significance of discovering a small community of allies who not only accept but celebrate your authentic self, allowing it to shine brilliantly amidst the darkness. This is the significance of the Transgender Day of Visibility (TDOV).

TDOV is a day that our local churches can embrace and celebrate the diverse identities of transgender and non-binary individuals, affirming their intrinsic worth as creations of God. By providing a welcoming space for positive and genuine representation, a local church can help these individuals feel acknowledged and valued for who they truly are. Furthermore, TDOV serves as a valuable opportunity to dispel misconceptions and promote understanding of the transgender and non-binary experience. Using educational resources and social connections, a local church can foster empathy and solidarity within the broader LGBTQIA+ and PC(USA) communities, thereby creating a more inclusive and supportive environment for everyone.

The Advocacy Committee for LGBTQIA+ Equity (ACQ+E) encourages both local churches and presbyteries to continuing our ongoing denominational efforts of diversity, inclusion, and Christian unity by recognizing March 31 as Transgender Day of Visibility.

The Session is pleased to report the congregation has stepped up generously in response to our request to increase pledges by 5% per year over the next five years. Total 2024 pledges as of January 20 are 2.5% above 2023 pledges. - * Based on the increase in 2024 Pledged Giving, the stability of our Reserves, and the frugality of congregational spending, the Session decided to continue its strategic investments, in spite of the sizable deficit, in external mission and advocacy, ministry and children and youth, and online worship tech support. This deficit will be covered by reserves, in the trust that congregational giving will continue to increase in the next four years.
