Pastor's Note: Winter's Last Days

I have often joked that God must have made February the shortest month of the year because it is the hardest, at least when it comes to winter's grip on the human spirit. Thankfully, we at SPC have called upon the wisdom of the animals to cultivate within us the spiritual gifts of the season: surrender, acceptance, community, and trust. As February unfolds, these spiritual gifts continue to nourish us in our worship and spiritual life; in our children, youth, and adult education; in our mission and advocacy; and in our care and concern for the congregation.

February includes, as well, more than its fair share of transitions: a new class of Deacons, including the election of a new Deacon Moderator (see pg. 8); a new class of Ruling Elders serving on the Session; and a new liturgical season beginning on Ash Wednesday (see pg. 5). If the past four years are any indication, we at SPC will navigate these transitions with joy and grace, compassion and love, even as new faces step up to take on familiar roles.

On a somewhat sad note, our new-ish and already beloved Choir Director, Steve Grives, has informed the Personnel Committee and the Choir that the precarious nature of his position at Shepherd University, combined with the challenges of his long-distance marriage, has led him to focus his priorities on seeking a more stable long-term position closer to home. In the meantime, he will remain at SPC on a somewhat reduced schedule, at least through the end of April.

The Personnel Committee will meet with the Choir this month to discuss next steps, including a potential search for a new Choir Director, and inform the congregation as the process unfolds. In the meantime, Rie Wilson has stepped up to coordinate Special Music for the Sundays on which Steve will not be available to direct the choir.

We know this news will be disappointing for the congregation, as it is for me and the Choir. Steve is a joy to work with and a great asset to the staff and congregation. At the same time, I know you join me in desiring only the best for Steve, along with the gratitude we feel for his remarkable gifts for music ministry and the genuinely delightful "match" he has been and will continue to be for SPC for as long as we can keep him.

As we navigate this somewhat harder transition, may we continue to call upon the spiritual gifts of winter and trust that God is, indeed, working all things together for good, for those who live in love and are called to God's service.



CHILDREN AND YOUTH UPDATE

Sunday, January 28, the youth group had such an important conversation and were incredibly attentive when Wendy Baraka, head of the counseling department at Shepherd University, came to generously participate as a guest speaker/leader. She led us through group conversation and activities in which we considered our own self-care, how we can better implement care in our lives through good boundaries, how we can learn to listen empathetically to one another for signs of mental distress, how to address suicide, myths and facts around suicide based on research from survivors (those who've attempted suicide or people who have lived through the loss of someone close by suicide), and scenarios for learning to speak honestly with people we may have mental health concerns for. She gave out some excellent emotional intelligence related handouts in addition to this rich and engaged conversation.

In other news from January, we had a fantastic time at the youth lock in on January 20th. We had the most fun playing pictionary I've ever personally experienced, a really wonderful lip-syncing contest, hide and seek in the dark sanctuary complete with a fun glow necklace sailing contest from the balcony, plus rich conversation related to communion and a connection to our Biblical roots, lots of junk food, and hardly any sleep! Hope to do this again--but maybe with more naps! It was truly a fabulous and important experience of connection and communion for these teens. I see them continuing to grow in love for one another and a feeling of deep peace and love for coming to the church.

Upcoming:

- February meetings are the second and fourth Sundays, February 11 and 25, 12:30 -2:30. Our theme will be "crossing Borders" and I'm looking into some fun ways to incorporate this through food, maybe a trip to an alternate church, etc. I welcome suggestions, chaperones, helpers!
- February 10th is the Souper Bowl Sunday collection. Youth have been asked to collect donations. The youth have been invited to select where the money raised will go. Ideas under consideration include organizations that support transgender concerns, organizations that support environmental concerns, and the Community Cup coffee shop ministry in Martinsburg. MODERATOR TRANSITION. This month Debbie Romano officially steps away from her role as Deacon Moderator in order to focus on her preparation for Ministry of Word and Sacrament. She has transferred from Wesley Theological Seminary to Pittsburgh Theological Seminary and from part-time studies to full-time studies. In addition, she will begin her supervised ministry practicum at another congregation this Fall and complete Clinical Pastoral Education in a chaplaincy setting in the following year.

As Debbie transitions her primary focus to ministry beyond SPC, we will transition her responsibilities here. The majority of Debbie's flock has been reassigned to our four newly ordained Deacons: Donna Dettling, Susan Lovell, Sherry Sykes, and Diana Wesley. A new Deacon Moderator will be elected at the February 3 Deacon Annual Organizing Meeting. A new PrayerNet coordinator will be named in the months to come, as will plans for pastoral care backup when Pastor Gusti is on vacation.

Debbie will maintain a smaller flock for one more year as a Deacon Shepherd before rotating off altogether. Please hold Debbie, the soon-to-be-elected Deacon Moderator, and the entire Deacon Shepherd Ministry Team in your prayers as we navigate this momentous transition.

February's Topic: How we read the Bible, based on *Presbyterian Understanding and Use of Holy Scripture:* Biblical Authority and Interpretation. Printed by the Office of the General Assembly, this booklet contains two papers written in response to the need for a common basis in a diverse church for understanding and using Scripture. This booklet may be downloaded in its entirety from https://www.pcusa.org/resource/presbyterian-understanding-and-use-holy-scripture/

Guidelines concerning how the text is rightly used include, but are not limited to:

The Use of Knowledge: "The way in which the biblical testimony should be used needs to be thought out in the light of contemporary claims, insights, and theories that bear on the question."

The Use of Experience: "Out of their individual and corporate experience members of the church become sensitive to dimensions of Scripture not previously discerned."

The Centrality of Jesus Christ: "any teaching of the Bible on a matter of faith or life is to be used in a manner consistent with scriptural accounts of Jesus' own teaching and embodiment of the person and will of God."


The Interpretation of Scripture by Scripture: "texts should not be selected arbitrarily to support a position in disregard of other texts that qualify or contradict the position."

The Rule of Love: "No interpretation of Scripture is correct that leads to or supports contempt for any individual or group of persons either within or outside the church."

The Fallibility of All Interpretation: "no doctrinal or ethical interpretation of Scripture, whether long established or new, is to be accepted as a final word, but is always subject to possible revision and correction as a result of further study of Scripture."

The Relation of Word and Spirit: "neither careful rationale nor logical deduction, nor use of all the tools of critical-historical exegesis, can guarantee the right interpretation of Scripture. After we have done the best we can with all the means at our disposal, we depend on God's Spirit to enable us rightly to hear and believe and obey."

March's Topic: The Book of Revelation, focused specifically on Chapters 21 and 22. Based on Barbara Rossing's *The Rapture Exposed: The Message of Hope in the Book of Revelation*, which makes the case for reclaiming Christianity from fundamentalists' destructive reading of the biblical story and back into God's beloved community.



West Virginia Poor People's Campaign

Gathering at the State Capitol, Charleston Saturday, March 2, noon

West Virginia is joining with more than 30 states across the nation holding simultaneous assemblies and marches at their state capitals on Saturday March 2, 2024. The

West Virginia's Poor People's Campaign members and allies will be in Charleston to raise our voices in non-violent solidarity and make our demands to WV State Legislators. We will deliver a moral indictment of the cynical priorities and immoral policies of the WV legislature toward the poor and low-income citizens of our state.

Our state capitals are not just symbolic, they are the policy hubs whose decisions directly impact people facing systemic poverty and interlocking injustices keeping families and individuals in generational poverty. You are invited to join with us, The Poor People's Campaign, a National Call for Moral Revival when we gather next month.

Our movement includes poor and low-income people, clergy and faith leaders, and activists and advocates that will send a message to the legislators responsible for the unrelenting policy violence against the more than 660,000 poor and low- income people in our state. These state-wide rallies will focus on demanding policy and action toward creating living wages, voting rights, stopping voter suppression, equal rights for all, worker and labor rights, environmental justice, access to housing and healthcare, fully funded public education and abolishing poverty, the fourth leading cause of death in the U.S.

Our movement acts in a unity of love, rejecting the acceptance of injustice. We won't be silent anymore.

The Session is pleased to report the congregation has stepped up generously in response to our request to increase pledges by 5% per year over the next five years. Total 2024 pledges as of January 20 are 2.5% above 2023 pledges. We will continue to encourage the congregation to give as generously as you are able. ^{*}The Session approved a 2023 budget with a sizable deficit, covered by reserves, due to increasing costs from inflation, a larger commitment to supporting external mission and advocacy, investments in ministry with children and youth, and online worship tech support. The Session based these decisions on the information gathered from the Congregational Assessment Tool and the Strategic Issues Team from 2016 – 2019.

^{*} Based on the increase in 2024 Pledged Giving, the stability of our Reserves, and the frugality of congregational spending, the Session decided to continue its strategic investments, in spite of the sizable deficit, in external mission and advocacy, ministry and children and youth, and online worship tech support. This deficit will be covered by reserves, in the trust that congregational giving will continue to increase in the next four years.
