PASTOR'S NOTE: Our Sabbatical Year

This fall, toward the end of October, you and I will enter our seventh year of ministry together.

Can you believe it?!

Seven, as I have shared with the congregation many times, is a biblical number of completion. The seventh day is the Sabbath. Creation is complete. God rests and celebrates and the people do, too. Sabbath in Scripture is more than "a day off": it is God's gift of freedom, justice, and healing — a holy interruption of endless striving and the harm that follows our human hubris.

The seventh year is also a sabbatical. An agricultural cycle is complete. For an entire year, the land (including the economy of the land) rests and celebrates, and the people do, too.

In this seventh year of ministry together, we at SPC will embrace an adapted approach to the biblical understanding of sabbatical. Indeed, we have much to celebrate! We have not only survived a global pandemic, a 100% staff turnover, and a thorough reimagining of "how we do church," we have thrived in the midst of it. A cycle of ministry is complete.

We have worked hard and prayed hard and loved hard and dreamed hard. This year, we step back and reflect on what it all has meant, trusting the fruits of our past six years of labor to sustain us in this seventh.

Our worship throughout the year will offer biblical and theological insights for this "Great Sabbath" opportunity. Through Autumn we will listen to the *cries* that make Sabbath necessary: cries of freedom, land, peace, rest, wealth, and healing. As we move into Advent, our theme will deepen into "Sabbath-With-Us" as we mark the coming of Christ. In January, our focus will turn toward "Practicing Sabbath" in ways large and small, in our congregational life and in our personal lives. All of this will prepare us for our shared sabbatical journey beginning in mid-February, as I re-trace the journey of ministry that led me to SPC and our Sabbatical Planning Team leads you through a similar journey.

This "Great Sabbath" sabbatical year invites us to receive Sabbath not as a break from life, but as God's rhythm for life — a rhythm of liberation, healing, and presence that renews us all.

CHILDREN AND YOUTH UPDATE


The summer gives the youth and children of the church a chance to connect without a curriculum. The youth group had a fun time heading to the drive-in theater twice for two fun movies, and gathering for our now 3<sup>rd</sup> annual pool party at the end of the summer.

The Sunday studio kiddos had a chance to create pictures of joy and hope for the Apache and other Native people of the Oak Flat region of Arizona. They also discovered a great delight in the art of sculpting with clay!

The big delight of the summer for our families was the baseball game. Complete with fireworks and food gift cards as we exited, this was such a highlight to see both parents and their children (young and not so young!) enjoying a Friday night out.

As we head into the fall, we're gearing up for a special new curriculum in the youth group. I had the opportunity to write this curriculum with a youth pastor colleague in North Carolina. Together, we crafted a curriculum around the Parables of Jesus, entitled "Once Upon a Parable: Real Stories. Big Questions. Kin-dom Vibes." Each selection includes a time of prayer, a game, a creative activity, and reflection/study time. This curriculum will be our focus from September through April.

Our Sunday studio crew will begin the fall with the theme "Do Justice," using the examples of Jesus to explore integrating justice into our everyday lives as we remember that small actions can add up to big results.







#### **AUGUST SESSION HIGHLIGHTS**

**Session's August meeting** was opened with prayer and a quiet time led by Pastor Gusti.

The Sabbatical Planning Team provided an update on their work. The team is envisioning a positive sabbatical for both Pastor Gusti and the SPC congregation. The group identified future state/conditions and actions, activities, or events the SPC community could put in place before, during, and after the sabbatical to drive desired outcomes. Specific areas include Greater Engagement and Deep Community, Shared Empowerment, and Mirroring the Pastor's Sabbatical with reflection and taking stock. The group is continuing work to provide information and specific actions.

Finance reported that overall income remains a bit ahead of expectations while expenses are approximately on target. Stewardship material will be provided on October 1. A printed letter and pledge form will be mailed with an email follow-up. Stewardship material will also be included in the bulletin, the Messenger, webpage, and E-News. The Stewardship theme will be "Stay the Course," including a request to increase pledges by 5% as in previous years. There will be a "minute for stewardship" beginning October 5 through the congregational meeting on November 16. The awards from the Lilly Foundation will be announced August 29. An anonymous donation of \$5,000 has been received which can be used to help cover Rev. Hitt's contract, if needed, or rolled over into the next fiscal year. A quote for SPC's insurance has been received with significant cost savings and is being reviewed by SPC Trustee Jim Crawford for adequacy of coverage. The committee will continue providing periodic reports on SPC's finances during the services on August 24.

**ICE Signage/Ushers** – Adam Ware will compose a guide card for the ushers to use if ICE agents show up during a service (an unlikely event). Signs designating private spaces will be posted on restroom doors and the office.

Moderator's Report – Pastor Gusti reported that she has stepped down from the Westminster Foundation due to being away on sabbatical. Board member Rob Mahaffey has secured a \$5000 grant for Campus Ministry. SPC can use this or use it in conjunction with another organization. Carolee Youngblood and Adam Ware agreed to be on the Nominating Committee with Suellen Myers as alternate. Wanda Stewart is taking a six-month leave of absence from Session while recovering from her injuries. Madison Quinn (daughter of Karen Waugh) has requested that her marriage take place at SPC on April 25, 2026. The Rev. Dwight McCormick was approved to preach on August 24 and 31. Healing Minds, Hearts, and Lives has asked SPC to co-sponsor their event on September 27 in Charles Town. This event is to raise awareness of the situation of Palestinian children. The request was approved.

**Deacons** – We had continuing discussions about some of the successes and challenges in our deacon ministries this year. There were many joys shared. Difficulties included finding the right balance of communication with flock members, knowing how to maintain contact with people who have moved, as well as feeling like a failure when someone doesn't respond. Out of these discussions came the idea of developing a "Sustained Care Team" of people willing to do regular visits and other types of assistance to those who may need more than a single deacon can provide. This will be a re-envisioned version of what used to be Parish Care. All but one deacon has taken the required Boundary Training, and she is scheduled for later this year. Unfortunately, Derek Smith has made the difficult and personal decision to resign as a deacon. His flock will be covered.

**Personnel** – The committee requested and Session approved Camryn Monroe as Nursery Manager replacing Olivia Gill and the approval of Sheila Melendez as director of the handbell choir. 5

**Property** – Daryl Kuster has retired, and Adam Ware has agreed to Chair the committee. At the last meeting of Session it was reported that the latch on the elevator needed to be repaired and the committee requested that the repair be approved. The estimated cost is \$1700. The request was approved.

**Worship** – Worship services for July were well attended, with new visitors joining us each week. Mica did an inventory of the plastic communion cups and found we have three boxes so we will use them until we are down to one. The glass communion cups have yet to be found. If anyone knows where they are, please let Lynn Dampman or Mica Martin know.

**Clerk** – Communion was served on July 6 and August 3, and will be served on September 7, as previously approved. The next stated meeting will be September 11.

The meeting was closed with prayer.

The SPC Session meets the 2nd Thursday of the month from 7-9 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall and via Zoom. Meetings are open to any member of the congregation who wishes to attend. Contact Suellen Myers, Clerk of Session, to learn more.

#### **DEACON TEAM UPDATE**

We hope you were present during one of the **worship services in July** to learn about our Share the Care philosophy and the Biblical origins of our Two-by-Two deacon partnerships, and hear reflections from a few of the deacons on our team. Their words were a touching reminder of the importance of the deacon ministry at SPC. **We also handed out our new Deacon Brochure!** If you didn't receive one yet, there are copies in the Narthex and the Fellowship Hall, or you can ask the church office to email you a digital copy.

At our August 2 Deacon meeting, we had an uplifting conversation about the successes and challenges of our individual deacon ministries with our flocks. We shared our joys and concerns, and worked together on ways to solve the challenges, including asking if anyone else on the team was familiar with the people we didn't know and had never gotten a response from. Our joys included making deep connections with certain flock members, people opening up to us with obvious trust, being able to support someone in crisis, and getting responses from people we had not previously heard from.

During this meeting, we decided to start a Young Adult Ministry through the deacon team, to provide support to youth who have completed high school and are moving on to college and/or work. We plan to send cards of encouragement, birthday cards, and care packages throughout the year. We will send our initial cards later in September, followed by care packages in October. Thanks for your help to get this ministry started, so we can keep our young adults connected to their church and let them know they are cared for!

## DEBBIE ROMANO - CANDIDATE FOR MINISTRY By Rie Wilson

Debbie is on her journey to become a Presbyterian minister. She has been a *child* of SPC since she joined in 1991. We are pleased to give the congregation an update on her path.

First, a little about Debbie's background. She was born in Maryland, then lived in various other places. She attended Shepherd (then) College in the early 80s, where she met and married her husband. They raised three children here who were baptized at SPC. She is now a widow.

As a teenager, she sensed a call to ministry while attending Fairfax Presbyterian Church. Her pastor and his wife were the first ones to encourage Debbie to discern a call.

While at SPC, Debbie served on the Deacon Board after her ordination in 2001 (alongside Sally Fitzgerald, the first openly gay candidate for ordination in the Presbytery). She implemented the Deacon Shepherding Program. Debbie is grateful for the special relationship with Reverend Jim Macdonell, now deceased, who guided her through the process and sensed her call to ministry 25 years ago.

She was active in Sunday school and nursery when her children were small and directed the Christmas Pageant for several years. Debbie served as Hospitality Chair, Presbytery commissioned representative, and SPC representative to the Eastern Panhandle Mission Community. Canterbury Center appreciated the monthly worship service of song, scripture, and prayer Debbie led for about 10 years. She was involved in administrative consulting and the church office before SPC hired an Administrative Assistant. Debbie was the Worship Committee Chair until she left SPC for her Field Education commitment in June 2024.

While Debbie was initially enrolled at Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, DC, she transferred to Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. She needed to enroll in Presbyterian Ordination classes to comply with Presbytery requirements and preparation for Ordination exams. Their hybrid program allows for distance learning. She attends in person two weeks each semester.

She has found all her classes to be rewarding, but her language classes (Greek/Hebrew) were the hardest. She took them in the summer terms covering two full semesters in 10 weeks! She has formed community with classmates, growing and developing through study of mission, pastoral care and counseling, theology, and from amazing class discussions. Debbie is on the chapel team, where she can express and learn diversity in language and traditions.

Debbie has now completed her Field Education at Tuscarora Presbyterian Church where she loved affirming her ministry abilities. New to this community as a student-intern, it took only a short time to be accepted and embraced as Pastor Deborah. The congregation and session embrace new perspectives and practices and have been patient and supportive. She will continue in this ministry until she graduates in May 2026 with her Master of Divinity (MDiv) degree.

There are still some major steps to take before beginning the process of *ready for a call*. She will go where God leads her. Debbie is grateful for the prayers and support from SPC as she continues her journey to ministry. She says, "Shepherdstown Presbyterian will always hold a big space of love in my heart."

## OUR WORK IN THE WORLD - SPC PARTNERS IN NICARAGUA By Kay Schultz

SPC has been assisting with ministries in Bluefields, Nicaragua since 2010. Ten of us participated in a mission trip there in 2011 with one teen, Alex Navarro, saying that the trip "helped open his eyes to the real world". Another said that the trip was about leaving his comfort zone entirely, realizing that possessions no longer mean as much because having friends and family who love us is all that people really need. Wendy Ranson, one of the adults who traveled with us, said in response to someone's statement that the trip must be very sad: "Yes, the needs and problems are great. But the smiles run rampant there as well. They seem to have a profound faith that God will look after them."

Our mission investments in Nicaragua have helped address a variety of local and regional needs including technical and food support for the school, support for the farm including the development of a Forest Conservation and Stewardship plan for the property, feeding programs for poor children and homeless adults, support for poor women expecting babies, support for widows and children in remote villages, digging wells, building a playground for children, and other improvement and care initiatives.

We have been supporting a young man named Maynor during his high school education and university study in agroecology. He is now in his second year of university studies. He sent us a letter last month:

"My name is Maynor Ariel Guillen Lira, I am 19 years old and I am from the city of Bluefields, Nicaragua. I studied at the Verbo Christian school, in primary and in secondary, where I benefited with a scholarship that provided me with school expenses until my final year of secondary school. Today I am in my second year at the National Agrarian University (Managua) studying Forestry Engineering and I still receive the same support for my university expenses. My parents also support me because they want to see me succeeding in my career.

My hobby is learning English and music. I want to get a guitar and be able to learn how to play. I have put a lot of effort into myself with the aim of learning and improving myself every day. The difficulty I have had in my studies is mathematics but, even so, I try to give the best of myself in order to make the most of the support that Shepherdstown Presbyterian Church gives me in my career of Forestry Engineering.

I enjoy walking in various parts of the country for exercise and taking notice of the land around me. What I am learning about the career as a future engineer, makes me committed to the protection of our resources and the sustainable development of forests. That is, I am preparing myself to be a guardian of forest ecosystems, promoting the balance between conservation and the responsible use of resources.

My mother, Andrea Lira Gaitán, is 47 years old. She was a teacher, but due to illness she was forced to resign, so now she is at home. My father, Antonio Guillen Garcia, is 60 years old. He works in construction but he does not have a steady job. He works in different jobs that come day by day. We are five brothers and three sisters, of which I am the youngest.

I want to express my deepest gratitude first to God and then to Shepherdstown Presbyterian Church for the valuable support you have given me in my studies. Thanks to your generosity and faith, I can continue to prepare myself as a future forestry engineer. Your help is not only an academic opportunity, but also a sign of Christian love in action. May God multiply in blessings all that you do for young people like me. Without further ado, I wish you success in your daily lives.

Your help has been a blessing in my life.
