PASTOR'S NOTE: Sabbath With Us, the Heartbeat of Advent

Dear friends,

All autumn long, we have listened to the *cries that make Sabbath necessary* — the cries for freedom, peace, help, rest, and renewal. Now, as the nights grow longer and the candles of Advent begin to glow, those cries begin to transform into a heartbeat — the heartbeat of Christ, who comes as *Sabbath-With-Us*.

This Advent, we link Sabbath with the mystery of incarnation — the astonishing truth that God's rest, God's justice, God's joy has taken flesh among us.

December 7 — The Path of Peace

John the Baptist calls us to prepare the way for Christ by clearing the clutter from our hearts and communities — not through fear, but through peacemaking.

• December 14 — Joy That Restores

Mary sings her Magnificat, proclaiming that joy itself is an act of resistance — joy that lifts the lowly and fills the hungry with good things.

December 21 — Love Made Flesh

Joseph wakes from his dream and chooses love — quiet, steadfast love that shelters the vulnerable and brings the holy into the ordinary.

December 24 — Birthing Sabbath With Us

On Christmas Eve, we join creation's long labor, midwifing God's rest into the world. Here, in flesh and breath and light, we birth the Sabbath that has always been God's dream for creation.

December 28 — Protecting Sabbath With Us

Even as angels warn and families flee, God's rest persists. The Sabbath is fragile, yes, but fiercely protected by those who listen to its whisper in a still too-weary world.

In this season, Sabbath is not simply a pause from busyness. It is *the Presence that meets us in the midst of it*—the Christ who comes not to escape the world, but to dwell in it fully, restoring the sacred rhythm of creation.

May we prepare room in our hearts, our homes, and our collective life — not just for a holiday, but for the holy rest that takes flesh and dwells among us.

CHILDREN AND YOUTH UPDATE

The youth and children have had a busy and exciting month! In youth world, the highlight of the past month came on October 26 when the youth and I led the 11:00 a.m. worship service. The theme, designed by the youth and me, centered on 1 John

4:16-18, with a focus on love in the presence of God and Jesus. This love can and does hold all of us, including our fears. Almost every youth member showed up to lead a series of vignette-style skits that depicted the group in an art class where they were "painting" their fears. Both the surface fears, like a fear of crowds or heights, and deeper fears that drive people, like the fear of disorder or of being out of control, were depicted. Between the two modern-setting art class skits was a skit that showed the Mark story with Jesus walking across the surface of a lake to the frightened disciples in their boat. Peter's willingness to step out of the boat was discovered and considered. Huge thanks are owed to both Amanda Groff for set design, construction and directorial support, and Morgan Wisniewski for additional directorial support.

In the two weeks prior to the service, we had the opportunity to contemplate fear and love in the context of our relationship with God and to consider the fears so many of us live with. The youth were mature, sensitive, compassionate, wise, and humorous in their work with the topics. It was an incredible delight!

In the meantime, our younger folks have moved from contemplating justice to considering Good News! It's been fun to look at examples of good news being told or revealed in the Bible, as well as good news that keeps revealing itself every day when we pay attention. We are creating a "Good News" banner that we're excited to share with the congregation during the month of December.

I have finished the fourth of my courses through Union Seminary that are required for the Christian Educator certification. This course provided me with a wealth of resources that are enabling me to design curriculum for the children currently and will continue to inform future programming for the youth as well for adults. I am excited to offer the upcoming Advent Sunday Studio class on November 30 that was designed with these resources.



NOVEMBER SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

SPC Session met on November 13, 2025, at 7:00pm with a quorum present.

Budget & Finance reports that giving is slightly ahead of expenses and that pledges are coming in at about the same pace as last year. The transition to Erie Insurance has been completed.

Christa Mastrangelo Joyce gave an update on her studies toward certification as a Christian Educator. She's finished 4 of the 6 blocks of study and feels that she has been given the tools to better understand reformed theology as well as a deeper understanding of living into faith. She has also written a new curriculum for Youth Group based on the parables. She will finish the program next spring.

Debbie Romano met with Emily Gross and Suellen Myers. Although it was hard to step away from SPC, all is now well. She knows that she is exactly where she is meant to be. She will graduate in May of 2026 and will do her 400 hours of chaplaincy work over the summer in Harrisonburg, VA. She will also have five exams to take before she can look for a Call.

Moderator's report - Rev. Mary Jane Hitt has begun her Parish Associate contract. She and Pastor Gusti meet weekly to discuss questions and lay the groundwork for her guest ministry. Bible at the Bar continues with record turnout for discussions. The Ministerial Association is hosting a Thanksgiving Service at New Street United Methodist on November 23. An offering of food and funds will be taken to Shepherdstown Shares. With a motion by Anne Teresa, seconded by Dave Smith, Rev. Harry Daniel, was **approved** as Guest Preacher for November 23. The request of Robin Landes to be received into membership by letter of transfer was **approved** on a motion by Anne Teresa seconded by Dave Smith.

Deacons -Susan Lovell and Sherry Sykes boxed up 25 care packages and sent them out to our young adults the week before Halloween. Susan has already received positive responses from a number of the recipients. The deacons are planning an Autism Acceptance Month event for Sunday, April 12, 2026.

Adult Education reports a wonderful response to the topics discussed in the recent Sunday Seminars and are looking forward to next semester.

Clerk -Minutes for the October 9 meeting were **approved** with a motion from Mary Anne Hitt seconded by Dave Smith. The next stated meeting will be December 11, 2025.

The meeting was closed with prayer and adjourned at 8:50pm.

At the November 6 Presbyterian Women's meeting, thirteen ladies joined us in person and on Zoom. Mica Martin led the discussion on Chapter 3 – Fight - in our powerful book *See No Stranger: A Memoir*

and Manifesto of Revolutionary Love, by Valarie Kaur. The author tells us that, "Any act to change the world around us begins within us. It starts with a sense of agency, a sense that we have the power to effect change. We don't know what to do next, but we don't have to know. We just have to hold on consciously to our conviction, and be ready to act when the world says "Now." We also discussed the three evils named by Rev. Martin Luther King: racism, poverty, and militarism, and a fourth, sexism, suggested by Kaur. We are enjoying the book so far, and the personal stories she writes about make it all very poignant and real.

We began a **collection of the National Presbyterian Women's Thank Offering** at our meeting and concluded it on November 20. Our donations are sent to the National group to be distributed to ten organizations doing work related to health ministries and other vital services.

Our bi-monthly SPC-sponsored Midweek Manna Free Community Meal at The Community Cup in Martinsburg was held on Wednesday, November 19, at 6:00 p.m. The comfort foods we provided were very much appreciated by over 40 people with food insecurity in the Martinsburg area. Our PW group partnered with the Eastern Panhandle Youth Alliance again, and as always, many hands made light work. We are grateful for Susan Lovell's leadership of this program, and to all who contributed food or served the meal. Our next dinner will be in January.



Our November 2, Communion Sunday collection of non-perishable food for the Jefferson County Community Ministries and Shepherdstown Shares food pantries was our largest to date. SPOTLIGHT ON CAROL WOOD Deacon for Animals By Rie Wilson



Carol grew up on a farm in Illinois which made it easy to connect with animals. They had chickens, sheep, and lots of barn cats which she loved playing with. Her best friend was her dog Stormie, who was only a pup, but at seven years old, Carol was only a pup herself. Stormie walked her to the school bus every day and waited in the driveway for her to get off the bus when she returned home. When Stormie passed away, she was devastated, and it took her a very long time to heal.

So, Carol knows how painful it is to lose precious animal companions. She realized her mission at SPC was to show recognition and support for them. She asked Pastor Gusti and Debbie Romano (then deacon chair) about becoming the Deacon for Animals and her calling was accepted.

Carol has let her mission be known to the congregation. For the most part she receives calls, emails or texts after the animal has crossed over. In understanding how personal the loss of a companion is, she always respects people's space and privacy. She will call, send a card, and in time address people when she sees them. She also has a list of veterinarians who will go to a person's home to administer the steps necessary for euthanasia.

Carol has worked primarily with domestic animals, like cats and dogs, and the Animal Welfare Society in Jefferson County is her number one organization. However, as a true animal lover, she is thrilled to have done hands-on work with The Elephant Sanctuary in Hohenwald, TN and with gibbons rescued from illegal trading at the International Primate Protection League in Summerville, SC.

When asked about the effect of climate change on animals, her immediate response is that the loss of sea ice is a huge threat to polar bears. They depend on it to hunt, mate and travel. Carol shares other information about climate change through conversations, and emails from conservation organizations like Earthjustice and World Wildlife Fund.

She has received many positive comments about her ministry at SPC from people who understand and support the fact that our animals are part of our families. She wears her Deacon for Animals nametag when she is out and about and shares her purpose with SPC and others she knows. She welcomes SPC folks telling others about her service.

In Carol's words, "I have realized my calling and am excited as I move forward with my ministry as Deacon for Animals."
