PASTOR'S NOTE: Sabbath as Practice

Dear friends,

Through the long nights of Advent and the shimmering hope of Christmastide mystery of The Great Sabbath, not merely as rest but as Incarnation: love made flesh, peace born in paradox, divine presence dwelling in us and among us.

As the year turns, so too does our focus: Sabbath as Practice. Not simply thinking about Sabbath, but *living it*. Not simply pausing for breath, but *learning to breathe differently*. Not simply waiting for a day of rest, but *crafting a rhythm where rest is always welcome*.

In our worship this month, we practice the rhythm of Sabbath together:

- With our children and youth as Sabbath Shines Forth on Epiphany Sunday (January 4)
- With a baptismal blessing of *belovedness* (January 11)
- With a recommitment to justice on Racial Justice Sunday (January 18)
- With a celebration of shared leadership and community as we ordain and install new leaders (January 25)

On January 18, I will also host a conversation between services on “A Theological Frame for Our Time,” offering wisdom from our tradition and our Scriptures for facing injustice and speaking truth to power.

Each movement brings us closer to a threshold: **My sabbatical begins in earnest February 15.** In this final full month before I step away for rest and reflection, my heart is full with gratitude for all we have created together these past six years. I am also filled with enthusiasm for what the future will hold.

Let January be gentle with us. Let us practice refuge, resilience, resistance, and reimagining together — one breath at a time.

After a month of thinking forward to the Good News of the Christmas message and the good news in their lives, we celebrated with our annual Christmas parties. Each group played a series of games, including a "snow ball battle" and a blindfolded scoop the Christmas bows relay. Truly, we ate, drank, and were merry as we celebrated our friendship and excitement for the season together. Our finale for the month was wrapping gifts for one of the children whose family was adopted this Christmas by SPC's Immigrant and Refugee Support Committee. So, we end the month and year by sharing the good news into the world at large.





DECEMBER SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

Session met on December 11 and a quorum was declared.

Discussion of the letters of the Chicago Clergy, Catholic Bishops, and Shepherdstown Quaker Meeting resulted in proposing an educational event based on an explanation and discussion of their theological framework. This will possibly take place on the weekend of Martin Luther King Day.

Personnel - The committee proposed a 3.5% increase for all staff as well as continuing education, guest musicians, benefit costs, etc. Also included was a proposal to support Christa Mastrangelo Joyce's attendance at the annual meeting of the Association of Partners in Christian Education to be held in Pittsburgh in the spring. She will also be attending a course for her certification. The Committee's proposal was **approved**.

Finance – Pledging continues on track while general giving is ahead of expectations.

Draft Budget – A draft budget was presented to Session for discussion and questions. A final budget for 2026 will be voted on in January.

Moderator – Sabbatical planning continues with Mary Jane Hitt having begun her Parish Associate contract.

Bible at the Bar met at SPC to discuss the book *Christ in the Rubble*. The final Bible at the Bar before Sabbatical will be on February 5.

Pastor Gusti participated in the Candlelight Vigil in support of immigrants, Wednesday, December 10 in Charles Town.

Adult Education – Next semester Sunday Seminars will focus on the topic of fostering more community by getting to know one another better.

Clerk – Communion was served on November 30, December 7, and will be served all Sundays in Advent. On a motion by Suellen Myers, seconded by Emily Gross, the serving of communion on January 4 was **approved**. The minutes of the November meeting of Session were **approved** on a motion by Anne Teresa, seconded by Keri Mahoney.

The meeting was closed with prayer and adjourned at 8:50 p.m.

The SPC Session meets the 2nd Thursday of the month from 7-9 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall and via Zoom.

SPC'S FINANCIAL HEALTH REPORT

Stewardship Season is Here, Budgeting is Around the Corner

Let's Build the Future Together

As we enter this season of reflection and gratitude, we invite you to join us in shaping SPC's mission for 2026. Your pledges are the foundation upon which we build our annual budget. They allow us to plan with confidence, sustain our ministries, support our dedicated staff, care for our sacred space, and extend SPC's impact far beyond our walls.

SPC's budget process is around the corner. Here are the steps of the process:

- The pastor's terms of call for 2026 were presented and approved at the Congregational Meeting on November 16.
- The session also approved the personnel committee's recommended staff funding for 2026.
- The session will review a draft budget at their regular meeting on the second Thursday in January, and will finalize the 2026 budget at a special meeting on January 24.

Your pledge makes all this possible. Every pledge is a promise—a promise that SPC will continue to be a place of worship, service, and community. Whether it's your first time pledging or you've been a faithful supporter for years, your gift matters deeply.

Please pledge what you can. Together, we can ensure SPC remains a vibrant and welcoming spiritual home for all.

Stewardship Update:

- As of mid-December, 82 have pledged to the Operating Fund totaling approximately \$265,556, and 37 have pledged to the Building Fund totaling approximately \$37,474. Pledges are 89% of \$298,000, which is this year's fundraising goal - 5% above last year's operating fund goal. While substantial funds still need to be raised, we are on a pace comparable to last year's stewardship campaign.

The surplus for the year can be carried over into next year to reduce the projected gap in the 2026 budget. This financial health allows us to continue our mission and ministries.

At the December 4 Presbyterian Women's Group meeting, nine of us joined in person and on Zoom and wore holiday headbands and hats in celebration.

Donna led the discussion on Chapter 4 – Rage – in our book ***See No Stranger: A Memoir and Manifesto of Revolutionary Love***, by Valarie Kaur. We began with a video of the author from an October speech she delivered about the concerning state of the country, and particularly the impact of administration actions against the immigrant community. Her words were powerful, and delivered with her usual eloquence and force. It stirred us all into much conversation and led easily into this chapter and her encouragement to process our anger and rage into safe containers (weeping, venting, writing, art, music, meditation, etc.) in order to begin to heal from our traumas.



Our November **collection of the National Presbyterian Women's Thank Offering totaled \$770**, which was sent to the national organization for distribution to the charity organizations they designated. Our group is very generous and caring, and we thank everyone who gave.

Throughout January, we will be collecting items for the **Bethany House shelter for women and children in Martinsburg**, and welcome help from the congregation in this effort. Their needs are: twin bedding (sheet sets, blankets, pillows, mattress covers), towels and wash cloths, laundry detergent, paper towels, toilet paper, and Walmart gift cards. **There will be a collection box in the Fellowship Hall and we encourage you to give generously to support this much needed shelter.**

We hope you will join us for our next meeting on January 8 at 10:00 a.m., which will include our annual soup and bread lunch. Please read Part 2 - Chapter 5 – 'Listen' in the book *See No Stranger*. The conversation and fellowship are impactful and supportive. Feel free to bring a friend!

OUR FEATHERED FRIENDS

As we move into colder temperatures and shorter daylight, one of my "giving back" to Mother Earth favorites is feeding the variety of birds in my yard. I hang my feeders out around the end of October as nature's food source begins to dwindle. I provide high energy feed such as black oil sunflower seeds, peanuts and suet cakes. Birds with smaller beaks, like finches, enjoy Niger seeds hung in mesh pouches. Once I make the commitment to feed our feathered neighbors, I make sure the food supply is always available to them.

As I watch the show of the different bird varieties feeding, I wonder how those little bodies stay warm? Some shiver, like the Carolina Chickadee, burning energy to stay warm. Others fluff their feathers, trapping pockets of air in the hollow quills of the feathers covering their bodies. Still others, like Tree Swallows, cuddle and roost together gathering body heat from one another.

As winter temperatures continue to dip, I am gifted with winged visitors stopping by my backyard offerings and I feel satisfied, knowing I am helping our feathered friends make it through this frigid season of winter.

ANAR Helping Palestinian Children

On September 27, a number of SPC members and friends attended a luncheon at Alfredo's Mediterranean Grill in Charles Town as part of a fundraiser and educational presentation on behalf of Palestinian children. The pictures of children, the speakers, and images of a child's world in Gaza all left impressions difficult to erase. Nor should they be.

Getting help of any kind to Gaza is challenging, but Healing to Hope manages to embrace that challenge with its support of Anar, a Palestinian, non-profit in Gaza that directly supports children. Healing to Hope promotes the emotional and psychological healing of Palestinian children and caregivers impacted by violence and oppression. They do this, in part, by raising awareness about and supporting the work of [Anar](#) in Bethlehem.

As a US-based organization, Healing to Hope shares Anar's vision to advance the well-being and resilience of Palestinian children, youth, and caregivers through meaningful psychosocial support and arts-based healing as forms of collective resilience. From its base in Palestine, Anar works to break the cycle of intergenerational trauma and build community.

And yet, one wonders how this could possibly be achieved in the environment the children are living in today. These three programs are rich and impactful—and provide direct support.

Community Based Psychosocial Support Program enhances the coping mechanisms of a community to be a hub of self-help to provide immediate assistance to children and caregiving.

Shabeek, Children and Youth Mentorship Program takes the empowerment right to the children themselves, helping children and youth aged 15–29 develop leadership and life skills along with community development, mobilization and advocacy. Building leaders is essential to continuing the work.


The Makan Program is designed to facilitate healing through play, creative and artistic adventures which allow for self-expression. Children explore art, theatre and dance as tools for reflection and expression. "Makan" means place or space in Arabic.

At SPC, we have been engaging in a variety of activities to learn more about Palestine, the children in Gaza and what more individuals can do. Fay Stump who is a coordinator for TEAM (Together Educating and Advocating for Peace in the Middle East), encourages us to read and attend the book events they are organizing.

One of the moms receiving the gifts was so thrilled about the bike for her son and was tearful at getting all the clothing and supplies for the children. Another parent said, "I didn't have anything for my son; he will be so happy and surprised." One other mother was noticeably relieved by the delivery. The older son was also excited and shared some news on several personal accomplishments that were huge for him. All the children have been supported by counselors and school staff on their growth in both school and life. They have worked hard and thrived despite significant pressure on them due to both not speaking much, if any, English as well as having family challenges related to immigration.

This is the 4th year the Immigrant and Refugee Support Committee has managed this project. We love doing it. Thank you all for your hearts and time and talent in spreading Christmas joy.
